FORMAT CHANGE AK Relay Championships

The following is a relay format I would like considered for the Auckland Relay Championships. I put forward this proposal not for the sake of change but for a better event and because of some concerns about the existing format. Before presenting the format let me indulge in some reasoning behind my request for change.

Firstly, a concern of the present format has been the length of time unseeded teams have been taking to complete the event when the seeded teams have finished. This new format will I am sure overcome that.

Another concern is the trend in thinking, towards making these relays less competitive and more a fun type event. Personally, I do not favour the lowering of a championship event to a fun type status. However, I do see a need to provide fun type events and as will be seen, this new format offers the opportunity to present both types of event at the same time.

Another concern has been the necessary workload that goes into such events. Once again this new format would greatly reduce both pre-event and on the day event workloads.

Added attractions for this new format are mass starts, reduced timing and calculating, no individual times, only teams times and no course setting. (What!!!)

THE FORMAT

Quite simply, it's a score event format. Forty, fifty, however many controls (number to be decided) which have to be visited by the

team(not each individual member). After a mass start each competitor picks up a map showing all control site locations. With maps in hand, good management is then needed to allocate which team member will visit which controls.

Team placings will simply be based on the last members finish time and confirmation that all control sites were visited by the team. That is the basic format, but to enhance the fun, the competitive and the spectacle side of such an event a two section structure would be used.

SECTION 1:

This would focus on the fun aspect, with a teams makeup being made by a random selection process ie drawing names from a hat for each graded team position. I envisage this draw being made half an hour or so before start time. This aspect in itself could be a lot of fun if presented in the right manner

To add to the spirit of this section, graded team positions will be made up from any club by the draw thus eliminating club and preselected teams.

SECTION 2:

This would focus on the competitive aspect of the event with the winner taking away the Auckland Relay title. Team selection for this division would be based on the present graded criteria ie 5 members selected on the grade and points system. Each club would put forward 3 to 4 teams(number to decided by AOA) with the title being decided by the best accumulated time of the 3 club teams or the best 3 from 4 teams.

To add to the spectacle of such an event there would be two massed starts. Section 1 would start at 10am with Section 2 starting at 11am. The reason for this is that hopefully, section 1 competitors will have returned in time to cheer on their clubs rep teams(Section 2).

I see this format offering a great spectacle if well presented. To add to the fun of the occasion why not stipulate fancy dress for Section 1 competitors. Could be quite hilarious seeing someone named robbie flitting through the forest dressed in pink tights and tutu.

Well thats it, surely there's something to satisfy everybody and thats what its all about.


Invitation to a social evening

Venue : Temu Rd, Woodhill Forest
Start Times : 10am to 12.30pm
Course Setter : Mike Ashmore

- Course 1. - 7.00Km - long, very difficult
- Course 2. - 5.65Km - short, difficult
- Course 3. - 3.85Km - medium length and difficulty
- Course 4. - 2.25Km - medium, easy
- Course 5. - 1.50Km - short, easy

This event will be run in conjunction with the WOC squads annual 5Km and 10Km Fun Run. Proceeds from this event will be donated to the 1993 New Zealand World Orienteering Championships team. Your attendance will not only assist the WOC team but also help promot the sport in a practical way to the 2000+ runners who will be attending the Fun Run. Please note parking will be a premium at this event as you are advised to be there extra extra early.

COLOUR CODED EVENTS

The introduction of a series of colour-coded events to our calender next year has drawn some mixed feelings among Auckland orienteers. I believe this series will be a terrific way of helping people advance in orienteering after the summers series which all three club run. In the past, the closet equivalent has been a forest promotional event run by Central Club often on Temu Road, with 4 or 5 courses. This event has always been well attended with 200+ people, and a series of similar events will be an excellent way of improving the orienteering skills of newcomers and hopefully will entice them into a long-term involvement with the sport.

The courses will be: Red Long, Red Short, Orange, Yellow and White.

The two red courses are for experienced orienteers only and should be approximately 7km and 4km. The orange course should be about 5km long but with controls that are placed reasonably close to obvious features and/or with catching features. The yellow course of about 3km should have the same features as the orange course as well as using handrails where possible and the white course of 1-1.5km should be very easy to cater for the very young and new people. Taping between controls is to be used if necessary (The above course lengths are for flattish areas and should be reduced for steeper areas.).

It is vital that all courses be set so very few (if any) people DNF or take excessively long times.

Each club should have 2 or more instructors and where possible regular club people should help explain to newcomers. Clubs have a chance to use inexperienced course setters with experienced controllers, but please controllers, don't be afraid to change courses dramatically; too many controllers simply check control sites.

Color-coded events therefore provide a good opportunity for both novice course-setters and novice orienteers as a stepping stone before trying an O.Y or a major event.

NZU BLUES AWARD

Congratulations to Alistair Landels who was awarded a New Zealand University Blues Award in Orienteering in 1991. The NZU Blues Award is the highest sporting honour bestowed upon University Sports people.

1992 WOC SQUAD AND DEVELOPMENT SQUAD

These were announced in issue 17 of Mapsport but are also listed on the attached sheet.

PUBLIC LIABILITY

The NZOF has a Public Liability Policy with Norwich Winterthur Insurance (NZ) Limited. The limit of the indemnity for any one accident is \$1 000 000 (1 million dollars).

This policy covers damage to property, including the cost of fire fighting. Personal injury is not included as ACC covers this.

For a claim to be made it is understood that the landowner would need to prove negligence by the organisers or by an individual. Permission to be on the land would of course have to be granted in writing.

Events sanctioned by the NZOF (i.e. on the Fixtures Card) or organised by an affiliated club of the NZOF are covered by the policy. Organisers of events other than these should seek sanction from the NZOF Management Committee.

IOF CONTROLLERS CLINIC

In December 1991 Ken Holst, the NZOF Technical Convenor, attended an IOF Controllers Clinic in Switzerland. Financial assistance was received from the Hillary Commission for him to go (\$2500) with additional funds coming from the NZOF.

At this seminar Ken was licensed as an IOF International Controller. He will be the controller for the World Cup race in New Zealand in 1994, and has offered to control at the APOC event in 1994 too.

Ken's report from the clinic is attached. If clubs wish to find out more about the clinic, or particular aspects of it, they should contact Ken directly.

NZOF CONTROLERS SEMINAR 1992

In August Ken Holst will be running a Controller's Seminar at Flock House, near Bulls. It will be run along similar lines to the mapping seminar held in June 1991. \$500 has been budgeted from NZOF funds for this seminar so airfares and other expenses will need to be paid by clubs or individuals.

The VIP (Volunteer Involvement Programme) funded by the Hillary Commission but administered by Local Authorities is an avenue for funding for this seminar. Applications close very soon for this funding (or may have already closed) so clubs should enquire at their local council right away.

A form for clubs/individuals to register interest in the Controllers Seminar is attached.

APPROVED CONTROLLERS CRITERIA

Ken Holst has put forward a proposal for registering controllers for major events, and how they are promoted to or demoted from the A or B list. The draft of this proposal is attached for clubs to make comment on. Further discussion will take place at the Controller's Seminar.

SENIOR A GRADE COURSES

The Technical Officer has asked that all courses for Senior A grades (including M60+) must be of a "difficult" technical standard at all Badge Events. B grades should not be run on the same courses.

HILLARY COMMISSION FUNDING

As we receive a substantial grant from the Hillary Commission they have asked that we acknowledge them in various ways such as printing the Hillary Commission logo on maps, in newsletters, in Mapsport, and by displaying banners at major events.

Club secretaries have more details on this. We ask that club and area newsletter editors and mapping officers make an effort to publish the logo and statement of acknowledgement, and that major event organisers check with the NZOF Secretary their responsibilities.

MAORI SPORT, FITNESS AND LEISURE

Hillary Commission funding is available for Maori sportspeople - for individuals at a national level, for young achievers, for administrative cadetships and for Iwi Organisation Grants.

The NZOF Secretary has further information on what funding is available to Maori and who exactly is eligible for such funding.

QUEENS BIRTHDAY 1992

North West Orienteering Club is now able to offer a 3-day badge event at Queens Birthday Weekend - at Muriwai (new map), Mt Auckland (updated map) and Otukinini Topu (updated map).





