Robinson 37th in Classic Final

A little insight into an exciting race from Tania herself. "Well, the race started on a stand in front of the finish spectators (this a very new thing, as normally you are way out in the middle of the forest only a coach and a few nervous competitors in sight). To my surprise

I was introduced as a competitor that had the potential of a top 10 place, maybe even a podium place – very nice. Then with friends waving and crowd cheering I made my way off into the forest. The course started in rather low trees that made me a little nervous and I was quite slow warming into the race. But as I got going and the land started to stand out before me I loved it. We crashed through trimmed forest, waded through green marshes and slid down huge cliffs past masses of rock – you know all the stuff we live for. I had a great middle patch, where I was orienteering like I would at home (in control) and then headed for the last part past large T.V cameras hidden ‘Camo-style’ following your every step. In all it was very physical under-foot (some have described it as shitty), very technical and definitely a World Championship Class race. And only having 3 weeks to train to get used to about the most opposite to N.Z terrain possible and a very early start, I’m proud of my 37th place and I hope it’s alright with all you groovy orienteers at home.”

Alistair messed up the first control, got caught 6 minutes by a Brit and decided to do a big Jamie. He decided to finish at that and considered the other three races more important than a mediocre result on what could be a tough day.

Men 19th place in World Champs Relay

The New Zealand mens relay ran creditably in the World Champs Relay in Finland and were satisfied with 19th place. Alistair Landels went off first and was still with the leading pack at the spectator control halfway around, albeit just hanging on the back. Unfortunately in the last loop he had no company on his splits and a 45 second error on the second last saw Switzerland get past him, and he came up the chute just under 4

minutes down in 13th place, an excellent effort.

Aaron Prince was on the other long leg, and he handled his first World Champs relay like a veteran, his run only marred by a 3 minute error towards the end in the tricky stuff. He came in 18th place, but it was always going to be difficult to hold out the likes of Omeltchenko and Jorgensen who started just behind him.

Jason Markham was off third, and had a solid run and almost held his place. Like the others, one mistake spoiled an otherwise excellent run. It was left to Greg Barbour to hold out the likes of Italy, Germany and Ireland. While the Germans got past and Ireland caught him up, he had a very clean second half (and dropped the Irish - phew) and we think we finished 20th. But the Italians, who finished one place behind us, think they were 19th, so who knows. There were 34 teams, and we have just missed a top half result in terrain that may as well be the moon given its difficulty and unfamiliarity for the Kiwis. We're happy.

A small mention must be made of the Australian's effort who finished in sixth place. Superb. Outstanding.

Unfortunately there was no womens team for the first time since 1976 so there's nothing to report there.

IOF Adopts Annual World Championships

At the IOF Extraordinary General Assembly held today, Orienteering will have an annual World Championship from the year 2004. Applications will shortly be invited in a quick application process, with the IOF Council choosing the organiser as soon as possible.

However, the IOF Council's proposal regarding separate qualification routes to a World Championship was withdrawn when it became clear it was not well supported. They have undertaken to do further analysis and present a new proposal regarding qualification in 11 months time at the 2002 IOF Congress.

In one small positive news for smaller Orienteering nations, the proposal regarding race formats was adopted, with the modification that the "Middle" format is not deemed to be the Olympic format. The good news for New Zealand is that future World Championships (from 2004?) will include a three person relay for men and women, rather than the current four person relay. This suits countries with not so much depth and also may help keep team sizes down.

Discussion on these issues was lively and a certain outspoken President was photographed during the meeting by Swedish and Norwegian journalists, and interviewed afterwards. He expects to see his handsome face on various orienteering internet sites and in orienteering magazines shortly.

Kiwis hit last two events hard

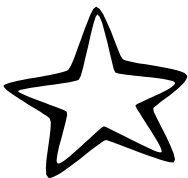

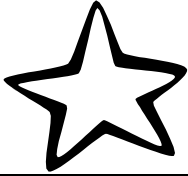

NZOF Course Setting Competition Update



At publication date for the last issue of New Zealand Orienteering we had not selected the maps for the 2001 course setting competition, nor did we have a judge.

New Zealand Orienteering is now pleased to announce these details:

Categories 1, 2 & 3, individual courses, map is MATAKAWAU, courtesy of Counties Manukau. Last used in the Queen's Birthday 2000 3 Day event it was described thus: "..... Matakawau is one of the best and most complex farm/forest areas in the country with plenty of route choices, even for the lower classes...".

Category 4, relay course, map is BOTTLE LAKE, courtesy of PAPO. A long time favourite, Bottle Lake is fast coastal sand-dune terrain, ideally suited to an exciting forest relay.

Competition judge will be MIKE BEVERIDGE. We are really pleased to have Mike, one of NZ's best and most respected course planners, take on the judging role. Mike was, along with last year's judge, Marquita Gelderman, the course planner for the Finals at WMOC 2000.

So if lack of map or judging information has held you back from entering, then delay no more. You still have oodles of time, completed courses do not have to be returned until 31 September. Full competition details are in the July issue of NZ Orienteering, or email jim.barr@xtra.co.nz for information
